




40% of Agricultural Land in US Is Owned by Non-Farmers








Summary of HRES Sales • Trend 2016 - 2023



Justice for Black Farmers Act of 2021--Background



- From 1868 to 1934, federal government gave away 246 million acres of farmland, in 160-acre land grants, to over 1.5 million white families
- These federal land grants became the source of wealth creation for millions of White Americans as they improved the land, engaged in agriculture production, and leveraged the asset to start businesses and make investments
- Over the past 100 years white farmers have also utilized USDA loans, subsidy programs and grants to expand their operations and weather difficult times
- However, Black farmers were denied this assistance through a long history of racist discrimination by USDA
- When Black farmers tried to speak out about these injustices, USDA systematically ignored/dismissed their claims

Justice for Black Farmers Act-



- This systemic racism by the federal government coupled with market discrimination forced the dispossession of millions of acres of Black farmland and decimated the population of Black farmers in America
- In 1920, there were nearly 1 million Black farmers in the United States—Blacks made up 14% of US and farm population
- There were 926,000 (out of total 6,425,400) Blackoperated farms, or one-seventh (14.4%) of all farm operations
- Black farmers have declined by more than 96% since 1920 and is the only group declining in numbers



Justice for Black Farmers Act-

- Why the focus on Black Farmers?
- Now, a century later, there are fewer than 50,000 Black farmers in the U.S, --1.4% of the 2.8 million farmers and ranchers in the US
- Today, Blacks made up 14% of US population and only 1.4% of the farm population
- There are 35470 (out of total 2,042,220) Black-operated farms, or (1.7%) of all farm operations
- The Black-owned farms that remain are smaller on average than other farms and Black farmers make a fraction of what white farmers make in farm income
- According to USDA, 8% of Black Farmers receive funding from USDA
- Without Intervention, Black Farmers Will Become Extinct

Background on Development of Black Farmer Policy



- Efforts of 32 Black groups to work with 4 candidates running for president to develop policy statements
 - Senator Warren, Senator Sanders,
 Vice President Biden and Michael
 Bloomberg
- Senator Warren developed most comprehensive policy
- Senator Warren drafted the Justice for Black Farmers Act
- Senator Booker took lead for the Justice for Black Farmers Act in 2020
- Senator Reverend Warnock drafted Emergency Relief for Farmers of Color Act in February 2021



Justice for Black Farmers Act of 2021



- The Justice for Black Farmers Act was an attempt to create economic justice by eliminating lingering federal discrimination by creating fair access to credit and federal programs, which will provide the tools to grow that dream into a reality
- The bill put in place market reforms and invests substantially in regenerative agriculture to help level the playing field and make it possible once again for independent family farmers and ranchers across the country to thrive
- This model of fair markets and federal support created generational wealth for the ancestors of tens of millions of white Americans alive today –
- The Bill was an attempt to provide Black Americans and other Americans of Color the same opportunity

Policy Development- 2023



- Inflation Reduction Act
- Signed by President Biden on 8/16/22
- Highlights of Act
- Section 1005 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was repealed
- \$2,200,000,000 for discrimination financial assistance
- \$3,100,000,000 to provide payments for the cost of loans or loan modifications with respect to distressed borrowers* of direct or guaranteed loans administered by FSA

USDA Response-Fact Sheet



- Inflation Reduction Act Assistance for Producers Who Experienced Discrimination in USDA Farm Loan Programs
- Section 22007 of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) provides \$2.2 billion in financial assistance for farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners who experienced discrimination in USDA's farm lending programs prior to January 1, 2021
- Distribution of these funds is one step in the long march towards justice and an inclusive, equitable USDA. The program complements other assistance made possible through the IRA, including <u>assistance for distressed</u> borrowers






Potential Value of Native Agriculture Sector in Billions



Rural Populations










